



Our Antecedents

Collage (from the French *coller*, to glue) is a technique of composing a work of art by pasting on a surface various materials not normally associated with one another, creating a new whole; also work produced by this technique. A collage may include newspaper clippings, ribbon, bits of paper, portions of other artwork, photographs, theater tickets, fragments of an envelope, moss, even a dead mole, and other found objects, glued to a piece of paper or canvas.

The origins of collage can be traced back to the invention of paper in China (200 B.C.) and to

wider use by calligraphers in 10th-century Japan. But collage made a dramatic appearance in the early 20th century with its first use as an artist’s technique.

Georges Braque first applied wallpaper to a drawing; Pablo Picasso first applied a piece of oilcloth to a painting. The term *collage* was likely coined by Braque and Picasso and first used to describe Dada and Surrealist works, thus linking it to the beginnings of modernism.
