

Can CAA be luckier? March 26 was our fourth truly excellent zoom meeting featuring another inspirational talk by an accomplished collagist with strong messages.

Tech wiz Barbara Tabachnick (left) hosted the event, and Sylvia H. Goulden, presided.

FEATURED SPEAKER DELLA WELLS

“I don’t get mad anymore. I just make art.”

Ms. Wells, now age 70, became an artist at age 42. She had majored in psychology and sociology during a later life career change but was edged into artmaking instead. She found exposure quickly and now has a very large resume.




An introductory animated collage called “Della Wells & Mamboland” refers to a place where strong self-sufficient black women rule.



Della Wells, *Our Ancestors Remind Us That We Will Survive This America*, 18 x 16 2020

In *Our Ancestors Remind Us That We Will Survive This America*, the artist declares that black people will survive our current COVID and race relations hardships, having already survived slavery and Jim Crow. She frequently uses symbols in her pieces, like the chicken, which represent a truth, like the truth children realize of food animals having to die so we can eat.



Della Wells, *Did You Invite Mike Pence's Fly, to Come Visit Us?*, 14 x 11 2020

Recent work has been satirical, influenced by political events like the vice-presidential debate between Mike Pence and Kamala Harris. Another of the artists' frequent symbols is the quilt, a typically female artform practiced by many black women.



Girlfriend Night from 2010 is about women getting together and celebrating.



In *Yes, Sister These Are The Stars of Freedom*, the artist shows a mature woman talking to a young woman. The plight of young women, who need to understand their power, is of particular interest to Ms. Wells. Ancestors look out the windows and there is intergenerational flow. The flowers represent souls blooming, souls of people who can be who they really are. Watermelons represent stereotypes.



Me, Despite What You See, I am Watermelon Free, is a self-portrait in pastel and collage from 2020. The work is done on wood and incorporates found objects. The artist shows herself as who she is without stereotypes.



The 2019 piece at left, *Run Harriett Run*, is a tribute to Harriet Tubman, the escaped slave and abolitionist. The hands of ancestors reach out to us from the past. The clock represents time, which is important once we get older--what we do with it while we're here on earth and how we use it.

(Note to proofreaders—title on the slide was Right Harriett Run but during the lecture the artist said it was Run Harriett Run so I'm using that. And I'm retaining the misspelling of Harriet because the artist pretty much defended a title misspelling in an answer to another question.)

TIPS AND TRICKS FROM DELLA WELLS



Della Wells, *The Young Sister*, 24" x 18" 2020

Favorite substrates: canvas board, masonite, and heavy gauge Arches watercolor paper

Frequently used materials: magazines, art papers, handmade papers, fabric, bottle caps, found objects.

Glues used are acrylic medium, tacky glue, and Yes glue. Heavier objects are attached with E-6000 onto masonite.

Quilt images are created from pieces of paper, or they are pictures of quilts that are altered by the artist.

Della Wells rarely knows what she will make when she starts a piece.

She doesn't look for specific images like chickens. She looks for colors and textures. In workshops for kids, she doesn't let them use an image of an entire face, only parts, so that they can make something new.

Collage is like painting except you're doing it with paper. It involves textures, shading, and lighting.

Collage is about taking old things and making something new. It's like taking a bad situation in your life and making something new and beautiful.

For color printers, Wendy Tigerman recommends the Canon Pixma PRO-100 which prints in sizes up to 13" x 19". The newsletter editor's research indicates that this model is still for sale in the marketplace and that the newest model, also on the marketplace, is the Canon Pixma PRO-200.





Esther Pearlman has lots of news. Her painting “Spring” was accepted into the La feria de la Flores show at the Neutra Institute Museum of Silver Lake, which ran March 4 to 26th. Also, one of her collages, “Coping With My Hair I” was accepted at the Loveland Museum. To top off a busy month, Esther was the subject of an article about her show at La Café Vida in the March 18th edition of the Pacific Palisades Post. 11 of her washi tape pictures are on display for two months.

Elaine Langerman shares an image from her book, "My Aviary," a visual commentary of a catalog of a painting exhibition by Milton Avery. The piece was completed on March 7, 2021. It is a combination of digital and analog collage.

"During the time I worked as a guard and docent at The Phillips Collection (a small private museum in Washington, DC) Karen, our librarian, used to receive lots of books and catalogs that the museum really didn't want or had no room for. I came across this exhibited catalog of Milton Avery that I probably paid 25 cents (?) for and immediately saw this as a basis for 'building' another book of images upon. I constructed the new images right on top of the old ones. I scanned in the original images using my flatbed scanner. The book itself used to be spiraled together, but alas, as I was working on it, the thing just fell apart." All or nearly all of the pages have a picture of a bird. Elaine Langerman did not consciously act upon the Avery/aviary pun.




Original catalog illustration of a work by Milton Avery, altered at right by the artist.


Karol Blumenthal, *Climbing the Walls*, collage
